Cooperative Library Collections

Cooperative collection building is a formal agreement or an informal arrangement made between libraries or among library systems for the combined purpose of reducing duplication of resources, increasing the strength of niche collections, and optimizing resource budgets. The success of cooperative collection building is dependent upon a strong commitment to inter-library loan (ILL).

As a result of *The Winnipeg School Division No. 1 Union Catalogue*, ILL is flourishing among our school libraries. Through participation in the Manitoba Library Consortium, Library Media Services provides ready access to the collections of major library systems within the province via inter-library loan.

For example, the mandate of the Library Media Services Reference Library is to provide a collection of professional print materials on educational theory, methodology and practice; curriculum implementation; and unit and lesson planning. Because current and archival textbooks fall under the mandate of Instructional Resources Unit, Manitoba Education, Training and Youth and are easily accessible by our teachers, they do not form part of the Reference Library collection.

Similarly, easy access to an excellent professional print collection at Library Media Services should allow school libraries to target their \$10.75 per student library allocation toward student materials.

The mandate of the Library Media Services Audio-Visual Library is to

provide audio-visual resources with public performance and circulating rights for the professional development of educators and to support curriculum implementation by teachers. Library Media Services Audio-Visual Library resources generally consist of bigger-ticket items which are most often outside the normal reach of school library budgets. The collection does not include videos available through Instructional Resources Unit dubbing services because the low cost makes these products extremely affordable for school library collections.

Again, the Audio-Visual Library collection should supplement school collections and should allow the school library budget to be directed toward student materials.

The number of professional and audio-visual materials sent by schools to LMS Technical Services for cataloguing and processing suggest that

it is time to examine current practices to achieve greater efficiency and effectiveness in collection building.

A first step towards closer cooperation would involve

- checking the *Union Catalogue* to see if the professional or audio-visual item is already available at Library Media Services and arranging a loan, or
- requesting an inter-library loan, or
- recommending the item for acquisition by Library Media Services.
